EDITORIAL

It has come to our attention that certain rules of the SCCA pertaining to amateur status have been and are being administered and applied in a rather arbitrary manner. This brings to mind the old question "Pro or No Pro." Personally, we feel, in view of all the other countries attitudes toward this question, that there should be a revision in SCCA whereby it became incorporated with FIA to administer and to serve as the controlling body of ALL sports car racing in this country.

SCCA is in the position of being fully organized to govern and train drivers, oversee and control the events and to serve as a judicial body in the event of dispute. With USAO's rapid and healthy growth in the few races it has had this year, it is not too difficult to see SCCA as the head of a large empty mansion as many of the good drivers go over to USAC.

We feel that now is the time for decisive action on the part of SCCA. Either go Pro with FIA or amateur with a more rigid and uniform enforcement of the rules.
