# "HOT LINE"...

Those of us who survived the chills of this year's Freeze Bowl and now base predictions for next year upon it all share one universal conviction; it's gonna be a helluva year. Normally this event gives an excellent preview of the new season. However, because of the cars that won and the cars that didn't show, confusion reigns in the minds of prognosticators. Some classes seem tight while others appear to be favoring one car by a little bit. The SCCA has really got some competitive classes this year and are to be congratulated.

Let's analyze the classes:

H PRODUCTION: As last year, the battle will be between Fiat Abarth 750's and Sprites. However, with a new option list for Fiats, the battle will not be so heavily in favor of the Sprites. It's going to be close here. So far, it's been virtually no siddwewnxw in rhw performance of both cars. However, I've got to pick something, so this year I'll give a very slight nod to a resurgance of Italians. Odds: 50.5 to 49.5

G PRODUCTION: Last year it looked as though Morgan was going to walk away with it. However, the Morgan didn't compete and Pete Van Der Vate and his Sprite did with winning results. This vear, Pete has a Morgan so I'll have to favor it. But watch for a close battle with the Spridgets and just-getting-started Triumph Spitfires. Odds: 5 to 4

F PRODUCTION: This is really a nasty one. Tullius' win in a TR3 over a good Lotus on its own favorite stamping grounds would seem to indicate a sweep. If Tullius drives one regularly, he'll win going away. However, this ride is uncertain as it was in a borrowed car and Triumph is now selling 4's. Other hot contenders will be the Lotus, especially with the little Ford engine, the Sunbeam Alpine and the Alfa. The Volvo has an outside chance if Art Riley again makes all the races. However, I believe that Tullius will not continue in a 3 and that Don Sesslar will campaign his hot Sunbeam. Therefore an erstwhile and cringing nod to the Alpine. Odds: 10 to 9

E PRODUCTION: Although there are many good cars in this class, it looks like another year of Porsche domination. The only question is which driver? As this article is only about cars, I am spared at least this choice. Besides, I can't spell German last names anyway. Odds: 2 to 1

D PRODUCTION: Here the boys at Westport really got diabolical. When the TR4's swept E, they bumped them to D. Now that they've swept D, their bringing in the winners of last year's class C to do battle. However, the flying 4's have beaten Daimlers before and should continue to run away from them, especially on the shorter course. The big nemesis will be one certain Fiat-Abarth 1000 Twim Cam with Paul Richards up. If he makes the races and the rapid but comparatively fragile Fiat can hold up, he may pull an upset. However, the weight of numbers says no. Triumph TR4 it is. Odds: 4 to 3 (Next year maybe they'll put them against Cobras.)



C PRODUCTION: Another nasty. The Lotus Super Things have the power, weight and handling to win this. However, last year they broke engines, suspensions, transmissions and everything else in or out of sight including their drivers' hearts. The Simca Abarth 1300 has the speed and agility but has anybody seen one lately? The Morgan SS is outclassed (I may be sorry I said this.). The Lotus Elan (what a beautiful package) has the qualifications of a winner but may be too new. This leaves the old reliable Porsche Carrera sitting at the top of the heap. Odds: 3 to 2.

B PRODUCTION: There are all kinds of cars that might win this, but only one that has just about everything going for it. The XKE in Hansgen's hands has the speed and handling but there are not enough of the really hot ones for insurance. The Sunbeam Thunderbolt is untried and I personally am dubious about the handling with all that Ford up front. The Aston Martin DB4GT Zagato might be a possibility, but they are as rare as a cannibal's steak. This leaves the old Corvettes to win with a good fight from the Jags. Odds: 5 to 4

A PRODUCTION: I'm afraid the swift snakes will do it again. The Sting Rays are not fast enough (when will be GS become a production reality?). The GTO Ferarri's will outlast anything at high speeds, but most races will only be about 45 minutes to an hour long this year. Although the GTO's are rapid and mean as hell, the Cobras, with the help of the Ford's racing complex, should do it again. Odds: 4 to 3

Footnote: The Modifieds? Who knows? A Ford (there's that name again) juggernaut will probably win the big stuff. A Lotus 23, also with a little Ford will probably take the small ones and that's as far as I'm going in this area. So, place your bets!

Printed below is Paragraph 10 of VMSC's
Competition Regulations relating to points
which became effective January 1, 1964.

#### Points

- 10. a. Competition Points for participation in club events such as rallies, gymkhanas, field trials, concours d'elegance, etc.
  - l) Points for finishing positions will be awarded on the following basis:

Place	Points
lst	1000
2nd	900
3rd	800
4th	700
5th	600
6th	500
7th	400
8th	300
9th	200
10th	100

All members entering an event and not receiving 100 or more points will receive 50 points for entering.

- 2) O.D.'s receive 600 points (fifth place points). Helpers receive 400 points (seventh place points).
- 3) In events, such as gymkhanas and field trials, where cars compete in classes, separate points are given to each class.
- 4) In all events which are divided into competitive classes, there must be a minimum of five VMSC cars entered to make that class eligible to receive points. In the event that there are fewer than five VMSC cars entered, the class, for the purpose of awarding points, will be scored together with the next most competitive class as determined by the O.D.
- 5) A car with only non-members of VMSC is omitted in the scoring of an event. However, a non-member finishing in one of the top three places receives the trophy for that place.
- 6) No VMSC member may receive more than one set of points in any given event.

#### POINTS (con't.)

- Attendance Points for attending meetings and the annual banquet,
  - 1) Members are awarded 50 points for each meeting attended.
  - 2) Members of the Board of Directors do not receive points for attending Board meetings.
- c. Year-end Point Standing

To determine the year-end point standings, only three-fourths of the total number of club events are counted. For example, if the club has had 16 events, then the number counted is 12, and the <u>highest</u> 12 scores of each member are added together to give his competition points. If a member participated in less than three-fourths of the events, all of his competition points are counted. The attendance points are added to the competition points to determine the year-end point standing.
