#### EDITORIAL

A couple of other recent events also deserve mention. Bill Whitehead, the Scourge of Stuttgart, won his class and took second overall at the Mini-Malboro on August 20. I understand from him that it was an excellent event. Also, Ann and I went down to the P.S.C.C. 2-day Autocross over Labor Day, but not with Bill's success, though Ann won her class on day two. George Sykes was the O.D. this year, and put on one of the most enjoyable speed events I've run in many years. I'm sure Jeff Jeffries will have all the details in this week's "Stopwatcher", so try to get hold of a copy.

A word about some coming events. As the front page shows, John Ruble will be in charge for the September rally. For those of us who are becoming somewhat weary of gimmick rallys, this should be a welcome change, and a good warm-up for the Old Dominion Rally in October. You novices might give some serious consideration to running this annual two day event; the \$35.00 cost may be stretching some budgets, but the event is well worth it. If you ever run it, you'll never miss one.

Finally, don't forget Doris Belcher's Braille Rally, scheduled for September 10. It may have been already run by the time you receive this, and, if so, I hope Doris found enough volunteer drivers. It's a worthy idea, and deserves all the support we can give it.






