

EDITORIAL

The Board of Directors has been concerned with this plight for some time but to date has not been able to resolve the deadlock with local law enforcement officers, Boards of Zoning Appeals, landowners, and our insurance agent. Those who have tried to stage events know of the frustration encountered. The administration has not remained idle, however, and is presently pursuing a course which will ensure at least five speed events in 1969. The go-kart track at Ellerson is a prime location and is presently the object of a concerted effort begun by Bob Clements, a local attorney and VMSC member, and being carried on by Wilt Greenwood and Brad Peaseley. Negotiations are being carried on with another area club for the use or co-sponsor use of their facilities. A manufacturer in the west of Richmond area is being explored for the use of their parking lot. The field trial site is always available and will be used during 1969. A strong friend of this writer has proposed what may be the bomb-shell of 1969, but the availability of this site is contingent upon many things. Next year promises support from the Washington area as long as our events approach Old Dominion claiber, which won't be easy but is the stated objective for next year.

I look forward to a banner year for VMSC. At the present time we are passing through what may be known as the Golden Ema for VMSC and this will continue for the next few years - and longer if prudent management is maintained.

It is not without sadness that I end a year as co-editor of Checkpoints but feel sure that the following editor(s), as yet un-named of course since that is within the purview of the next president, will derive the same degree of enjoyment as I have. My best wishes are extended to all who will carry the cause of motor sports in the Richmond area next year for it is a demanding task. I wish each of you a joyous Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

We ran by the seat of our pants and slacks to have fun and fun we did have.

Fast average speeds, beautiful scenery, no mistakes in the instructions, new roads, some trickey but well thought out instructions, friends old and new; all this and more made the lith ODR a wonderful rally.

The Rallymaster and four leg O.D.'s have to be commended for putting on the most successful Old Dominion in the history of the event. The Checkpoint Crews did a fine job and they really did have to work with more than 40 cars running. Even with no more than three on some of the checkpoints we found they did their job well. Some of the things that stood out in our minds on the checkpoints were John Rubel's crew of attractive ladies, Henry Wheeler's loudest whistle, LymnWells's very relaxed group, Al Smith and the Hatches located where you just knew a checkpoint wouldn't be and how can we ever forget Hart Grundy on the last checkpoint with a worried look on his face and the question, "where are the rest of the cars?"

Saturday morning's leg was long and fast with plenty of dirt and six checkpoints. Al Smith had checkpoint 5 and 6 only $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles apart and caught us napping. The lunch stop certainly looked good about 1:00 P.M. since breakfast was 5:30 and the seats in the 912 were plenty hard before noon.

The Saturday afternoon leg was all on blacktop which was a pleasure. We have no love for dirt roads having bent two cars on dirt roads while on rallies. The speeds were lower in spots but some of the instructions became tricker. The "Milemaster" instruction lost a lot of the cars. A State Police License check in route gave us a small delay. Billy Dixon played games with us for some 6 or 8 miles as we held a 32 mph AS from the last checkpoint (but we didn't know it was the last) to the end of the timing instructions.

The motel was fine, the Cocktail Party loud and fun with a very good buffet dinner. The protests were few but grading for the Saturday run took some time. We were pleased to find out we were First Unequipped and twelth over all. So off to bed we went with it raining and Brad Peaseley having a kitten. (This we understood after running his leg Sunday morning.)

When we got up Sunday morning the rain had stopped but no sun and it was foggy. We were very happy it cleared up as the day went on as we had a mountain road under construction; or perhaps they were doing the whole mountain over. This interesting road with a pretty view would have been impossible if the rain had continued. We are glad we didn't have to miss it. There were some long stretches with many turns but no route changes. We drove and drove at one point which seemed forever, looking for "Andrew Morse" and believe me when Andy showed up we were two very happy people. We both feel this is a good rally practice but it does make you uneasy. Speeds on the hard surface roads were high enough to make the driving exciting. A few trick instructions kept you on your toes and cost us a minute plus at the second checkpoint.

The Sunday afternoon leg was fast and trickey. Late in the leg there were two instructions reading R at RIP Coca Cola. The first sign came just after a checkpoint and a route change. While we had no trouble with these intructions they did make Pepsi drinkers out of a good many people running the event.

The end of the Rally Cocktail Party was loud and even Chuck was putting it away. The dinner was enjoyed by everyone and again the protests were not too numerous. The grading was much faster and more pleasing then we had expected. Special praise must be given the Rallymaster for the way protests were handled.

In all we had a ball and feel that we couldn't have put on a rally nearly this good.


