Mutterings

Real Live Editorial #1

In the past several months there has been a great deal of discussion in the club (and in <u>Checkpoints</u>) about VMSC rallies and what is wrong with them. There has also been much talk about what is wrong with the club that it puts on such unsuccessful events.

Solutions abound. The most prevalent one is to make the rallies easier. Why? To get more people interested and keep them interested in rallying.

There are fallacies in this point of view. I'm greatly in favor of novice rallies (some of my best friends are novices); we're putting on a novice event ourselves. If, however, all that the club ran were novice type events, then that's the only kind of rallyist we would have. In rallying, like everything else, you learn by making mistakes. The greatest learning experience I have ever had in rallying was to run the BRM this year. Castleberry and I (mostly me) bought every trap that Bill Gronning laid out and a few we made up ourselves. It helped, though; Mike and I did as well as we did on the Ladies Rally because we caught the four bridges trap by reading the generals very carefully. Of course, we came up with a whole new set of blunders, but that's another story.

A steady diet of novice rallies is out.

A subgroup of the easy-rally school of thought likes the navigator's nightmare sort of rally, with easy course following, but multitudes of speed changes and other busy work. They claim these are good because nobody gets lost. Unfortunately, this type of event strongly favors the Equipped rallyist, so that the novice and Unequipped classes could easily get discouraged; and even the Equipped people can get tired of purely mechanical calculations. The mark of a really fun rally is one in which an Unequipped team can run on almost equal terms with an Equipped team just by staying super alert and outguessing the OD. After all, a computer isn't a great edge over a Stevens or even seat of the pants when you get lost or miss a timing trap.

So, it seems that what is needed is a rally program with something to interest everyone.

It would not be at all difficult to design a program which utilized what is the slack season in Richmond for rallying, the summer, for a series of novice events set up so that each one introduced the novice to something different. They would be short, and would not need to be hard or tricky and so could be easily laid out with only one or two traps. Three or four events such as this, possibly in connection with a school, could give the fledgling crews enough knowledge and confidence so that they wouldn't immediately give up the first time they hit a hard rally. They would hopefully instead figure out what they had done wrong and not make the same mistakes again.

The rest of the year could be given over to the usual sort of event. Presumably there would be enough variety both to keep the more experienced rallyists interested and to complete the education of the beginners.

It sounds rather simple; only four months of the year would be affected, easily laid out events, a whole new set of interested rallyists. Personally, however, I have few hopes that even such a small change as this could be effected.

The outdoor activities chairman has enough problems now just to get people to put on any kind of event. The battle cry of many members of the club is "This is not Washington," as indeed it is not. In the D.C. area, being an OD is more of a privilege than a burden; there are waiting lines of would-be rallymasters. There, it is simple to tell someone, you will put on this kind of event because that is what we need to complete the season. Here, the activities chairman is lucky to get enough OD's at all.

The problem is just beginning, however, when the OD volunteers for a rally. First, there is the matter of a checkout crew. If finding OD's is difficult, finding qualified checkouts is almost impossible. Basically, the best rallyists, the people you want for checkouts, can only do so many a year; after all, they want to rally too. Add to that the perennial scarcity of checkpoint workers, and you have a discouraging prospect. No wonder finding OD's is difficult.

Can you imagine putting on a series of events in which people have to work, or else the thing will collapse?

What am I getting at, you ask? Well, there are in this club about 130 memberships. A large percentage of these are family memberships, so a good estimate of club members would be 200. Okay, out of that 200, about 60 have run rallies this year (including last December's rally), and around half of them have run only one or two. This leads us to the conclusion that there are only 30 hard-core rallyists in the club. Even eliminating diehard autocrossers, this is not a very good showing.

It's the proverbial vicious circle. We can't attract new people because we don't have a decent rally program and we can't have a decent rally program without more people.

To be painfully honest I have no solutions. Appeals have been made before to the membership as a whole to come out and do something rather than just sitting around and asking what's wrong with the club. I can only hope that people will realize that a club is made up of members, and that when a majority of the members do little for the club, they can't expect the club to do much for them.
