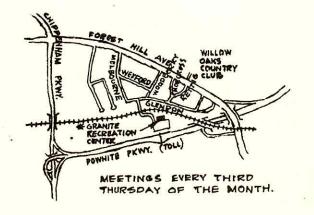

THE STATE OF THE SPORT

This being the first Presidential article in CHECKPOINTS this year, I think I should preface it with an explanation why there hasn't been one sooner. My reason is rather like the little boy who never spoke a word until he was eight years old. When he finally did speak, his parents were astounded. His father asked him why he had not spoken before and his reply was simple. He said, "Everything has been OK until now." That's the way I feel about this year. Everything has been OK until now. We've had some good events, few protests, and lots of new members. The area of my concern is the lack of competitive participation by our newer members, particularly in the rally program. I'm really concerned and I address this article to our new members.

No one can adequately describe the feelings they experience while participating in a rally. It is a highly competitive sport which demands many skills from a sucessful driver/navigator team. The driver must be able to control his vehicle in any sort of situation, at any speed, while following the directions given him by the rallymaster. He must be able to keep himself composed after making a mistake which might have cost him first place, and he must be able to do all these things simultaneously. The navigator, on the other hand, must learn to trust his driver to the limit. He must never cringe or scream no matter what apparent danger they may be in. It is in poor taste for the mavigator to attempt to exit the car while the driver is trying to execute a handbrake turn on some dead-end dirt road that doesn't exist. He must be able to establish a routine and maintain that routine no matter how rough the going may be. If he is calculating the time, he must be able to do this regularly, all the time helping the driver through tricky sections of the course. The team needs to understand each other completely.

There are many levels of competition in which you can compete. You are by now familiar with local club type events. These events are put on by someone in your club, primarily for local people, and is run in the nearby area. These are great training areas for budding rallyers. The Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) has two levels to their amateur program. Divisional rallies are one-day events, usually of 150 - 175 miles in length, which draw 50 - 75 cars from the region which is host for the event. National rallies are two-day events, usually of 300 - 450 miles, which draw 75 - 100 cars from all over because Nationals are the basis for the SCCA Rally champoinship. At this level you can expect the competition to be first rank. The nice thing about this sport is your option to choose your level of competition. If you want to run against the big boys, just lay your money down. If you should choose to run the lower pressure local events, you can still have a lot of fun. Gentlemen, choose your weapons!

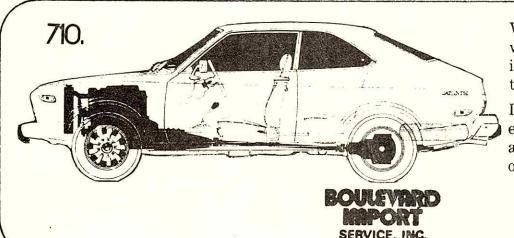
By this time I know you are champing at the bit wondering how it is you can find out more about this sport. I'll tell you, which is something your best friend might not do. Buy a book, read all you can, talk to every crotchety old-timer you can find, and run, run, run. Run every event time and finances allow, and even some they don't. There are several first rate books on the market but my personal favorite is LARRY REID'S NEW GUIDE TO RALLYING. There are those who would hiss and boo at the mere mention of Larry Reid, but for \$2.95 and

thousands of helpful hints, it's a pretty good book. It's available through the mails, in a plain brown wrapper, from a publishing house which advertises in ROAD&TRACK and in CAR AND DRIVER. This book will answer many of your questions and suggest different techniques involved in competition. If you've already rallied a few times it will help pull together some of the things you should have learned by now. As for talking to crotchety old-timers, there are plenty of them around this club who will be glad to help you. They know the stories about VMSC, and most of them concern rallies. One word of advice -- Ask them what you want to know and then let them tell you the answer. No one minds explaining techniques or concepts with new people, but no one I know enjoys a neophyte who tries to impress others more experienced with his "exploits". There are many worthwhilebits of information to be learned from this source. Finally, run every event you can. You learn faster this way. When you are running an event and you get lost, don't quit. Only losers quit. OK, so you made this dumb mistake and you are so far out of contention that it appears impossible to do anything, but keep going. You've paid your money for this learning experience so get your money's worth. If you don't understand why you made that mistake, corner the Rallymaster or one of the top finishers and get them to explain it to you. If you go away without doing this, chances are you will make the same mistake again. Another practice which I found useful for the first year is to re-run the event several days later. Why not? You've got the instructions and the roads are probably still out there, so what's to keep you from running the event all over again? You'll be surprised how different a tricky intersection will look when the pressure is off

Just remember, there are people all over this country who compete in rallys. It's not just some local perversion that's too complicated for you to learn. Most of the people who are running now are at their peak and who knows how good you can be? The only way to find out is to come out with determination and run every event. DON'T GIVE UP!! With a little luck and lots of homework you might just be the next "man to beat".

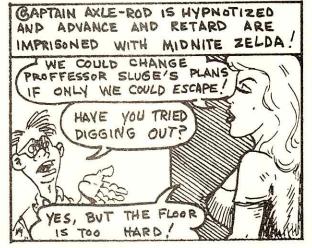

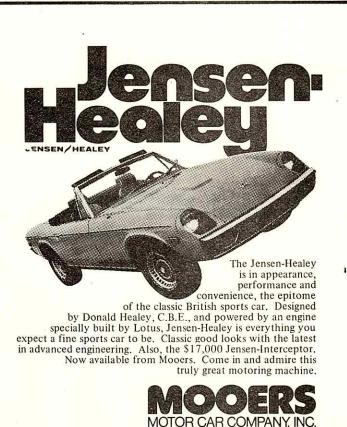

"A CROOKED MILE"

The beer drinking festivities following any rally are normally marked by people discussing the traps which they bought, and these same traps will be discussed forever, and ever. Amen. Some of the classics you may recall - Greenwood's differentiation between route signs (quoted), and routes (not in quotes) on the "Deja Vu" which floored practically the entire field of rally cars; the Castleberry-Turner mileage turn onto Elkhardt Road - which threw off even the experienced crews because everyone knew there was only one Elkhardt Road and assumed the novice OD's had screwed up the mileage; or the Greenwood-Beverage rally where the ralliest was start led to fin d "No Fishing" by the dump in the woods.

Fred & Marian DeBardeleben's "A Crooked Mile" was marked by lots of good course followin g and brisk speeds, and several of the classic type traps which will be remembered. Consider the possibilities when you are working with your regular route instructions compounded by the following conglomerate of specials. (Ignore the wording please!)

- SI #1: Turn R at 43.7 miles
- SI #2: Routes whose digits contain the number seven are to be considered non-existent.
- SI #3: Get onto a new route whose digits are the same as the digits of of your route. Do so by going L followed by two R's.

As we were travelling quietly down 616, my driver suddenly whisked off left onto 661 - a road I didn't even see. Breathing a sigh of relief, we began looking for our two rights. All was going well, until we made one of those rights, and found ourselves approaching official mileage 43.7 - and no opportunity to execute the special right at 43.7 miles. Panic followed, we quickly flipped to off course and hauled it back to the intersection of our right, only to find that the route number contained a 7. On down the old road, everything was going well again, until we hit that official mileage again; just in time, we realized that SI's "may be executed once, more than once, or NOT AT ALL." Thanks to a pause, we made up the time, and enjoyed talking about the situation over, over, etc. (The srt of thing that lends itself to getting caught on the next trap).

The rally was interesting and challengin g, and contain ed a good combination of general instruction traps along with the traps based on specials and numbered instructions. The course was quick, and most important, fail-safed. I hope it was as enjoyable for the novice as for the experienced crew. Thanks to Fred & Marian for a great event.

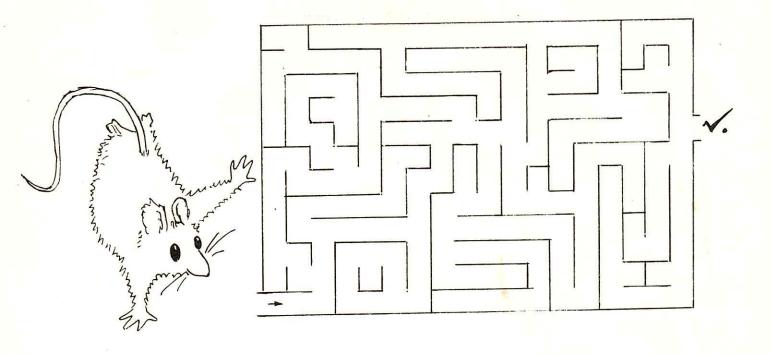
