
Section 11 F.

Year-end Marque Awards, as they are available (having been donated by area businesses), shall be awarded on a rotational basis.

Each award shall be presented to the club member who accumulates the most points in competition in a car of that marque during the year. These points shall be determined as designated in Section 11 A of the Competition Regulations, with the exception that only points earned in actual competition shall count; OD, checker, and worker points shall not apply.

All competition points earned will be counted; there will be no drops.

A permanent award shall be presented to any club member who wins the same Marque Award for three consecutive years.




