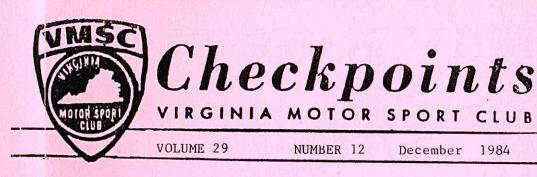

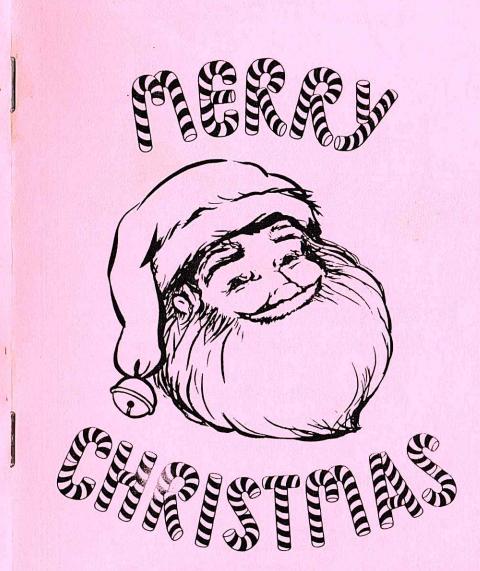

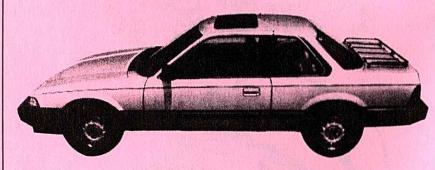

"They shall be awarded as in Regulation 4.1. A; however, only points accumulated in competition in a Speed Event will count towards this award."

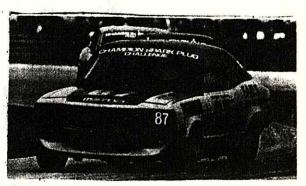

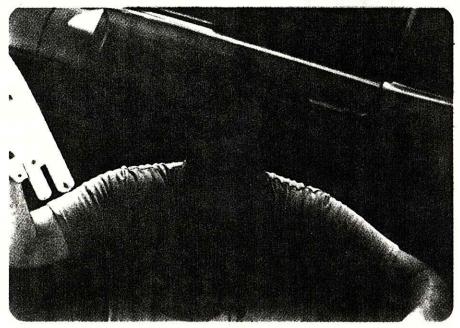

RALLY PROTEST - "MAINERAME"

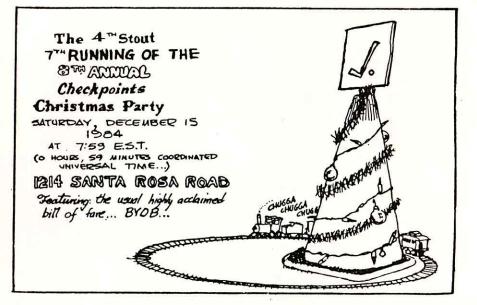

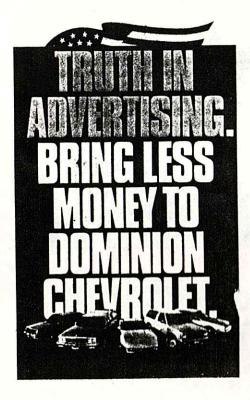
Car #1 protested leg one on the grounds that they had completed all the required actions of SB #1 and could then proceed to execute subsequent Program Instructions.

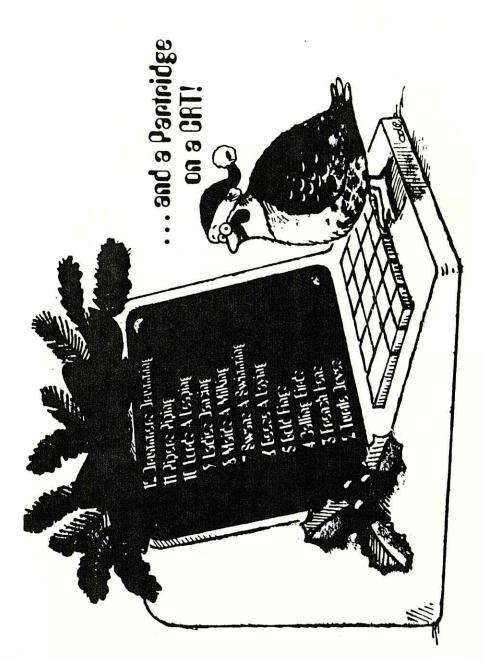
The Competition Committee denied the protest because the General Instructions appeared to be specific in this area regarding the continuation of speeds into and beyond the execution point of subsequent Program Instructions (i.e., only speeds begun in MP Instructions could be continued beyond that specific instruction.) Thus when SB#1 altered the contestant's speed, the only option for the contestant was to continue that speed and use Priorities 4 and 5 ("follow your route" and "staightest") to proceed on the rally course.
