

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE SPEED REGULATIONS March 7, 1985

The autocross competition committee met on Feb. 16, 1985. Four of the six members were present; the other two members were contacted. All of the proposed changes were passed unanimously by the committee.

STOCK CLASSES:

Add to section 7.3.2 B: Cars with 12" or less diameter wheels may use 13" diameter wheels.

Section 7.3.2 C: Delete first two sentences. Replace with: Tires may be one profile lower than original standard equipment, but not lower than 60 series unless stock from the factory.

Section 7.3.2 M: Change to read: The steering wheel may be replaced provided that the outside diameter does not vary more than $\frac{1}{2}$ 1".

Drop E STOCK due to lack of cars. Cars in E Stock will be moved to D Stock.

PREPARED CLASSES:

Section 7.4.1 0: Change section to read: Any DOT-approved tire may be used provided that the cord is not showing. No racing tires as defined in Regulation 7.3.2 C may be used with the exception of the Pirelli P7. Recaps are allowed in prepared classes provided they are on DOT-approved casings and have a street tread pattern.

MODIFIED CLASSES:

Section 7.5.2: Change to read: Single-seat open wheel cars which comply with current or past rules and specifications of SCCA, USAC, FIA, and other organizing bodies will compete in FORMULA CLASS with the exception that SCCA legal FORMULA V will compete in class B/M.

CLASS CHANGES:

Adopt MWCSCC class changes as noted below:

Car class changes as proposed by the classing committee: *C Stock cars to be moved to D Stock: Alfa Romeo sedans not otherwise classed; Arrow 2.6: Datsun 810 and Maxima; Fiat 124 Spyder/Coupe, 131 Brava; Mazda Cosmo: MGC; Toyota (all 6 not otherwise classes). *C Stock Camaro/Firebird V6 to be moved to GTS; *C Prepared Renault Fuego Turbo to be moved to E Prepared; *D Prepared Honda CRX 1.5 to be moved to C Prepared; *E Prepared Dodge GLH to be moved to D Prepared; *D Prepared Opel GT to be moved to E Prepared; *E Prepared swing axle Corvairs to be moved to F Prepared.

REFLECTIONS REFLECTIONS

This column is written just two days after I traded My Prelude for a new CRX Si. The whys are really unimportant; it's the impressions that are worth expansion for they give some revelations for the problems that the Club is experiencing. Yet, before you read on, no solutions are to be found or offered.


The difference between the two cars is more than cosmetic - for it lies in the heart and the senses. The Prelude is a GT in almost every sense of the word - good performance, comfortable, and with a degree of practicality. The CRX is a sports car - albeit not classically, but a sports car nonetheless - an automobile whose only reason for existence (and ownership) is fun. I am left with the feeling of a man who has taken a step backward in time, as if I were returning to my idealistic youth.

That last statement is the key to this composition. I find now, in retrospect, that I had fallen victim to creature comforts. Few people want to autocross in a Lazy-Boy - make up two minutes in my den - not on your life! I would venture a guess that most people have a better sound system in their cars than they do in their homes - and all the time bathed in the wonderfulness of air conditioning. The only thing missing is a hearth, mantle, and Sterno log but, not to worry, it's probably on the drawing boards even as you read this.

In my musings I truly lament the passing of the "them against Us syndrome" that used to prevail. "them" were all those who drove oversized, overweight non-descript, domestic barges. "Us" drove automobiles with character, charm, and flair (all no-cost options) - cars like the Porsche 356, MGA's and B's, the big Healeys (if you could stand the ride and that occasional exhaust system you'd lose on a speed bump). There was a certain camaraderic among "Us" - you'd see a Jaguar owner crossing racial lines to discuss ignition problems with a Sprite owner. Behind it all, though, the loathesome view "them" had of the automobile - the common bond - "Us" were different and unique - "Us" knew what cars were really for.

Today, "them" have discovered Europe and Japan, and Europe and Japan have discovered "them" (in the dollars-and-cents world there were always far more of "them" than "Us".) It hasn't happened overnight but there has been an insidious Continental drift and Detroit and Stuttgart are many miles closer together than they were fifteen years ago. A Buick owner will have a Honda, a Beemer will share a garage with an SVO. In simple terms, "Us" are no longer unique.

Perhaps we are entering another Golden Age for the automobile - all indications would seem so - perhaps we are on the verge of another Golden Age of the enthusiast. The former is in the control of the automakers and their marketing departments, the latter is in the hands of "Us".




