DECISION

Stout

I suppose it's every rallymaster's dream to, just once, create an event that can both keep experienced crews entertained and interested, yet not send a first-time team on a scenic tour of Wyoming. For most of us in VMSC, this had always been your basic no-win proposition. That situation changed on November 16 when Floyd and Marvin Mills unveiled "Split Decision." After two years with "Mainframe I" and its sequel "II," each employing two sets of route instructions (for one course), "Split Decision" seemed an almost logical extension. The rally's main feature was dual courses- one trapped, the other trap-free. The contest-ants decided which to run and marked the appropriate block on their scorecards prior to arriving at each control (if you ran the trap-free section, a 30 point penalty was added to your timing error). As it turned out, the entire equipped field was pronounced brain-dead. Any of the teams could have won by running the easy legs and not suffering a severe case of the stupids.

The course following priorities were standard fare: 1) execute a marginal-mileage instruction; 2) execute an SI (Special Instruction), these could be performed once, many times, or not at all- there were no SIs on the trap-free legs; 3) execute an NI (Numbered Instruction) or an ALT (Alternate Instruction- used if you chose the easy portion of a leg);

4) follow your route by number; 5) straightest.

The odometer check ended on route 301 with the crews looking to turn at a route whose number contained the digit O. A max to those who

failed to equate being "on" to being "at."

The second leg had an instruction that read "Pause .25 min. at '645.' " It did not contain NRC (No Route Change) and thus forced a change of route to execute it- a trap from an era when they calculated with an abacus. Biting this one felt much like shooting yourself in the foot.

Leg three used another time-worn trap-divisible vs. evenly divisible. "R at a route whose number is divisible by 614" might just as easily have been written "first R," since any number is divisible by 614-- the quotient just has a lot of decimal places.

This was followed by another trap that was based on a translational problem. "L if at a T" being merely a convoluted way to say "change

route."

Leg five was the most controversial and prompted some of the more animated discussions at Giuseppe's. SI 5 read "CAS 35. NRC." Once you began executing this instruction, you put the car on auto-pilot and continued executing it each nano-inch until you finally reached a control.

The sixth and final leg had perhaps the most beautifully set up trap of the day- rallying's equivalent to a sucker punch. The instruction was "the digit '6', then R" (digit being defined as an integer used in route numbers). The first sign encountered was for 1610 (four-digit roads don't exist ergo the 6 couldn't exist because it wasn't used in a real, live route number). At this point certain rally teams (names withheld to protect the stupid) put their brains into the off-mode. On the self-same sign post was a route sign, parallel to your route, that said "615", noting your current route. A big ugly awarded to the unobservant (we tried to blame spontaneous, mutual blindness- a curious, rare disease that afflicts only rallyists and journalists).

Floyd and Marvin deserve credit for, not only, staging an event that was commensurate with everyone's experience level, but also for generating triple-loop legs with on-course OETs that were never more than

.50 minutes apart (thus negating the oh-my-God-we're-on-the-off-course-loop-let's-check-the-easy-leg-and-take-our-chances luck factor).

* A note to any budding rallymasters: if you want to create "Rally-of-the-Year" quality rallies- I hope you were there, and I hope you took good notes.

COME ALIVE, COME AND DRIVE



THE WALTER MITTY CHALLENGE

The annual Walter Mitty Challenge is a sports car spectacular and an enthusiasts delight. The last weekend in April brings to Road Atlanta some of the finest racing machinery of the 50's, 60's and 70's. This vintage racing weekend offers the enthusiast an opportunity to test his skill on the unrestricted racetrack while enjoying the atmosphere provided by historic Porsche, McLaren, Lola, Chevron, Ford, Brabham, Elva, Ferrari, Jaguar, Lister, Morgan, Corvette, Cobra, Lotus, Maserati, Aston Martin, DeTomaso, MG, Austin Healy, Turner, TVR, Cooper, Morris, Alfa Romeo, Triumph, Saab, Datsun, Chinook, Cunningham, Allard, Bandini, Ausper, Siata, Fraser-Nash and other memorable racecars doing what they were designed to do. The tenor of the weekend is dominated by driving and enjoying the cars rather than by an intense effort to win.

The Sports Timed Runs event allows any driver and car onto the track for six 20 minute sessions, some for practice and some during which lap times are recorded. Trophies are awarded by fastest lap time. Cars are classed by displacement and by year of manufacture. Classes are earlier than 1959, 1960-1969 and 1970 up; each divided into less than 2 liters, 2-3 liters and 3 liters up; and each further divided into production and production modified. There are separate classes for turbocharged and race prepared cars. There are no speed restrictions on the track but passing is limited to the straights for Sports Runs. Typically, 4-5 clean laps are achieved in each session. The minimum safety equipment required has been a 1975 or later Snell approved helmet, leather shoes and gloves, a full coverage driving suit (Nomex recommended but a coverall work suit is OK), a competition seat belt and shoulder harness (crotch strap not required) and a roll bar in open cars.

The events are spread over a three day weekend with Vintage practice, qualifying and racing; competition exhibition by famous retired racecars such as Peter Gregg's Porsche 935 or Clay Regazzoni's F1 Ferrari 312T3; track touring laps; and a Concours d'Elegance filling the time. All participants and crew are allowed free access to the pit area which alone makes the trip worthwhile. VMSC has been represented at the Mitty for several years by Rich Fohl, Jay Dorsk, and Greg Miller competing in the sports runs.

The Walter Mitty is held the last weekend in April and is highly recommended for a most enjoyable weekend. Entry forms are usually available in December or January from: Walter Mitty Challenge, P.O. Box 2263, Roswell, GA 30077-2263. The entry fee has been \$120 for Sports Runs. There is also a drivers school offered on Thursday preceding the racing events. The Atlanta Historic Races follow the same format and are held at Road Atlanta in mid August. Additional information is available from Greg Miller at 804-272-3920.
